SLATE OF CANDIDATES FOR 1989 CHAPTER OFFICERS

As outlined above, new Chapter officers will be elected at the business meeting on Friday, 13 January. Walt Pollard of North Carolina (CP&L Brunswick Lab) has served as the nominations committee chair during 1988 and has put forth the following slate of nominees. Other nominations are welcomed either before or at the business meeting. If you wish to serve the Chapter in some capacity but do not wish to be an officer, several committee chairs will be appointed by the new President. Please let her know of your interest in serving. The slate of nominees is as follows:

<u>President</u>: Eileen Setzler-Hamilton (MD). Eileen was elected last year and will assume the Chapter presidency from John Cooper. She is employed at the Chespeake Biological Laboratory at Solomons, MD conducting research on larval fishes, anadromous species, estuarine nursery areas, and striped bass. Her undergraduate studies were completed at the College of St. Mary of the Springs (now Ohio Dominican). She obtained her MS degree from the

University of Delaware in 1969 and her Ph.D. from the University of Georgia in 1977.

<u>President-Elect</u>: Ed Christoffers (MD). Ed is in his nineteenth year of employment with the National Marine Fisheries Service in Oxford, MD. His current research interests lie in wetland values and functions and in cumulative impact on marine habitats and wetlands. Ed attended Michigan State University where he received his undergraduate degree. He recieved his MS degree at Eastern Michigan University then returned to Michigan State where he received his Ph.D. in 1986.

Secretary-Treasurer: Chris Bonzek (MD). Chris served as the Tidewater Chapter Secretary-Treasurer for 1988 and has been nominated to serve in 1989. Chris is the Fisheries Statistics Project Leader with the Fisheries Division of Maryland Tidewater Administration in Annapolis, MD. He has been employed with the Administration for eight years. Chris received his MS degree from North Carolina State University in 1983.

Maryland At-Large Member: Ron Klauda. Ron was nominated to serve for a second term in this office in 1989. Ron is a Senior Fisheries Biologist at the Applied Physics Lab, The Johns Hopkins University at Shady Side. Originally called Bourne's laind (1680), then Somervell's lained (1470), it became known as Solomona lained in 1870 because of least Solomon's owner packing stellites. His home still stands on the front of the sitand, in the 19th century, shippred developed to support the tained's finising fleet. The Marsh Shippard built chloomers and sloops, but became famous for its bargers, the foretunner of the skipped, in the War of 1812, Commodore Johus Barney's foodlist sailed from here to attack British vessils on the Chespeake Buy. The deep, protected harbor has been a buy marine center ever since.

Solomons is the home of the Calvert Marine Museom. This is an accredited museum whose enhibits include the Wm. B. 
